WELCOME



CALL TO WORSHIP: (Hebrews 1:3ff)

Leader: The Son is the radiance of God's glory

and the exact representation of His being, sustaining all things by His powerful Word.

CALL TO CONFESSION: (Hebrews 3:12)

Leader: See to it brothers and sisters, that none of you has a wicked,

unbelieving heart that turns away from the living God.

CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS: (Hebrews 7:26-27 & Hebrews 12:2)

Leader: We need a high priest who is holy, pure, innocent, set apart from sinners,

and who has the highest position in heaven, the throne of majesty.

Jesus, our High Priest, sacrificed for sins once and for all

when He offered Himself.

People: Dear Lord Jesus, it was for my sins You were offered.

Forgive me anew today,

especially of those things that bother me most.

(Silence for confession.)

Leader: Fix your eyes on Jesus, the Author and Perfecter of your faith.

Who for you endured the cross and scorned its shame.

He is at the right hand of the throne of God and for His sake your sin is forgiven.

People: Amen.

FIRST SCRIPTURE READING: Genesis 15:1-6

Later the LORD spoke his word to Abram in a vision. He said,

"Abram, don't be afraid. I am your shield. Your reward will be very great."

Abram asked, "Almighty LORD, what will you give me? Since I'm going to die without children, Eliezer of Damascus will inherit my household. You have given me no children, so this member of my household will be my heir."

Suddenly, the LORD spoke his word to Abram again. He said, "This man will not be your heir. Your own son will be your heir." He took Abram outside and said, "Now look up at the sky and count the stars, if you are able to count them." He also said to him, "That's how many descendants you will have!" Then Abram believed the LORD, and that faith was regarded as the basis of Abram's approval by the LORD. — GW ®

SECOND SCRIPTURE READING: Hebrews 11:17 – 12:3

When God tested Abraham, faith led him to offer his son Isaac. Abraham, the one who received the promises from God, was willing to offer his only son as a sacrifice. God had said to him, "Through Isaac your descendants will carry on your name." Abraham believed that God could bring Isaac back from the dead. Abraham did receive Isaac back from the dead in a figurative sense.

Faith led Isaac to bless Jacob and Esau.

While Jacob was dying, faith led him to bless each of Joseph's sons. He leaned on the top of his staff and worshiped God.

While Joseph was dying, faith led him to speak about the Israelites leaving Egypt and give them instructions about burying his bones.

Faith led Moses' parents to hide him for three months after he was born. They did this because they saw that Moses was a beautiful baby and they were not afraid to disobey the king's order.

When Moses grew up, faith led him to refuse to be known as a son of Pharaoh's daughter. He chose to suffer with God's people rather than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a little while. He thought that being insulted for Christ would be better than having the treasures of Egypt. He was looking ahead to his reward.

Faith led Moses to leave Egypt without being afraid of the king's anger. Moses didn't give up but continued as if he could actually see the invisible God.

Faith led Moses to establish the Passover and spread the blood on the doorposts so that the destroying angel would not kill the firstborn sons.

Faith caused the people to go through the Red Sea as if it were dry land. The Egyptians also tried this, but they drowned.

Faith caused the walls of Jericho to fall after the Israelites marched around them for seven days.

Faith led the prostitute Rahab to welcome the spies as friends. She was not killed with those who refused to obey God.

What more should I say? I don't have enough time to tell you about Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, David, Samuel, and the prophets. Through faith they conquered kingdoms, did what God approved, and received what God had promised. They shut the

mouths of lions, put out raging fires, and escaped death. They found strength when they were weak. They were powerful in battle and defeated other armies. Women received their loved ones back from the dead. Other believers were brutally tortured but refused to be released so that they might gain eternal life. Some were made fun of and whipped, and some were chained and put in prison. Some were stoned to death, sawed in half, and killed with swords. Some wore the skins of sheep and goats. Some were poor, abused, and mistreated. The world didn't deserve these good people. Some wandered around in deserts and mountains and lived in caves and holes in the ground.

All these people were known for their faith, but none of them received what God had promised. God planned to give us something very special so that we would gain eternal life with them.

Since we are surrounded by so many examples of faith, we must get rid of everything that slows us down, especially sin that distracts us. We must run the race that lies ahead of us and never give up. We must focus on Jesus, the source and goal of our faith. He saw the joy ahead of him, so he endured death on the cross and ignored the disgrace it brought him. Now he holds the honored position—the one next to God the Father on the heavenly throne. Think about Jesus, who endured opposition from sinners, so that you don't become tired and give up. — GW ®

Hebrews 1:1-2

Leader: In the past, God spoke to our forefathers

through the prophets, at many times and in various ways,

People: but in these last days, He has spoken to us by His Son.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Luke 12:22-34

Then Jesus said to his disciples, "So I tell you to stop worrying about what you will eat or wear. Life is more than food, and the body is more than clothes. Consider the crows. They don't plant or harvest. They don't even have a storeroom or a barn. Yet, God feeds them. You are worth much more than birds.

"Can any of you add an hour to your life by worrying? If you can't do a small thing like that, why worry about other things? Consider how the flowers grow. They never work

or spin yarn for clothes. But I say that not even Solomon in all his majesty was dressed like one of these flowers. That's the way God clothes the grass in the field. Today it's alive, and tomorrow it's thrown into an incinerator. So how much more will he clothe you people who have so little faith?

"Don't concern yourself about what you will eat or drink, and quit worrying about these things. Everyone in the world is concerned about these things, but your Father knows you need them. Rather, be concerned about his kingdom. Then these things will be provided for you. Don't be afraid, little flock. Your Father is pleased to give you the kingdom.

"Sell your material possessions, and give the money to the poor. Make yourselves wallets that don't wear out! Make a treasure for yourselves in heaven that never loses its value! In heaven thieves and moths can't get close enough to destroy your treasure. Your heart will be where your treasure is. $- GW \otimes$



For those wishing to use a self-contained communion chalice, let an usher know.


